### Teaching Experience

2003-	At Carleton University, I have taught two seminar courses, which introduce philosophy to thirty first year students: an introductory course on human nature and culture in an experimental program (ArtsOne), and two first year courses on contemporary moral, social, and religious issues. At the mid-level course level, I have taught philosophy of cognitive science and artificial intelligence, personal identity and the self, moral psychology, introduction to the philosophy of mind, and philosophy of religion. My advanced seminars have been on reason and emotion, the emotions, moral emotions, and theory of mind. My two latest graduate seminar were on evolutionary psychology, broadly conceived. In addition, I have taught tutorials in philosophy of science, moral psychology, philosophy of mind, philosophical psychopathology, and consciousness.
2001-2003	At Washington University, I taught undergraduate courses on philosophy of mind and moral psychology, and a graduate seminar on tacit knowledge.
1995-2001	At University College London and King's College London, I was a postgraduate teaching assistant and tutor. I taught undergraduate tutorials in the philosophy of mind, history of ancient and modern philosophy, epistemology, philosophy of science, and ethics. I also taught a discussion section for a philosophy of psychology class, and gave private tuition in the history of modern philosophy and the metaphysics of mind.

### **Administrative Duties**

At Carleton, I have served on tenure & promotions committees of the Philosophy Department, the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, the department’s webpage committee, the graduate committee, and four hiring committees, and I organized the philosophy colloquium series in 2004-5 and the Fall of 2010. 2005-6, I was the graduate supervisor. At the Institute of Cognitive Science, I have served on the search committee for a director of the Institute and on the curriculum committee.

At Washington University, I had two administrative duties: organizing weekly works in progress sessions and monthly interdisciplinary lunch talks at the Medical School. Both involved soliciting speakers – local professors, graduate students, or visiting professors – and setting up and hosting the events. In addition, I examined a graduate qualifying paper and an honors thesis.

### **Supervision**

I have supervised two honors theses for the Institute of Cognitive Science: one on the language of thought hypothesis and another on personal identity. In the philosophy department, I have supervised two MA research essays: one on the evolution of altruism, and the other on emotions and cognitive control. I have also acted as the internal examiner on a PhD thesis at the Institute for Cognitive Science, on four MA theses: one in philosophy, one in law, and two in psychology. Currently, I have two PhD students from the Institute of Cognitive Science working with me.

### **Service to the Profession**

I am assessing editor of *The Journal of Mind and Behavior*. I have refereed papers for *Mind & Language*, *Ethics*, *The British Journal for the Philosophy of Science*, *Philosophical Psychology*, *Synthese*, *Dialogue*, *Dialectica*, *Cognitive Systems Research*, *Philosophical Studies*, and *Canadian Journal of Philosophy*. On a regular basis, I review conference submissions for the yearly meeting of the *Cognitive Science Society* and *Society for Philosophy and Psychology*. NWO, the Dutch Research Council, had me review several research grant proposals.

Along with Chris Burns (Geography) and Root Gorelick (Biology), I have also been involved in the organization of a series of talks at Carleton University in celebration of the 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Charles Darwin’s birthday, entitled ‘Darwin Week’. It included lectures by Daniel Dennett, Patricia Gowaty, Charlie Krebs, David Livingstone, and Michael Summerfield during the week of Darwin’s birthday, followed by a later event with Rosemary and Peter Grant. The talks were taped, and formed the basis of a program in CBC Radio One’s IDEAS series (autumn 2009). In 2010, I helped organize a talk on climate change by Peter Singer for World Philosophy Day in Ottawa.
